

# **BLACK HISTORY MONTH**

ince 1976, February has been the designated month dedicated to the celebration of the arts, culture, and accomplishments of the African-American community. In keeping with these traditions, I have compiled a short list of some of my personal favorite films that both educate and entertain, making them my current must-sees of the month.

#### **CURRENTLY IN THEATERS: SELMA**

Directed by Ava DuVernay. Starring David Oyelowo, Tim Roth and Oprah Winfrey. 2014.

A historical film based on a series of protests and marches that took place in Selma, Ala., in support of equal voting rights in the American South in 1965, "Selma" is a rousing drama that retells the events leading to one of the most noteworthy triumphs of the Civil Rights Movement; the eradication of adverse voter registration laws in the South.

Told primarily through the eyes of one of the most prolific figures in American history, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., this movie acts as part feature film and part documentary, as it juxtapositions between the actors and real-life stock footage of the actual events that occurred. Even the narration of Dr. King's movement throughout the film is presented by real-life logs and records from the FBI, who were monitoring his every move during the time the film took place.

#### STREAMING ON NETFLIX: THE LOVING STORY

Directed by Nancy Buirski. 2011.

A gripping documentary that tells the true life story of Mildred and Richard Loving, the interracial couple who bravely lobbied the Supreme Court and brought about the overturn of anti-miscegenation laws that criminalized interracial marriage in the United States.

Mildred, an African-American housewife turned civil rights activist, and Richard, a Caucasian son of a rural working-class laborer, shocked the small town community of Central Point, Va., by getting married in Washington, D.C., in 1958. The Lovings were arrested and ordered to leave that state. They were only allowed to return home to visit their Virginia families separately with their children, but never together as a couple. Mildred decided to take



a stand, and over the course of a nearly 10-year battle with the Supreme Court, the Lovings prevailed and helped change the face of the American modern family.

#### ON DVD/BLU RAY: MALCOLM X

Directed by Spike Lee. Starring Denzel Washington, Angela Bassett and Al Freeman, Jr. 1992.

Based on the autobiography of the same name, this classic film deeply examines the life of African-American activist Malcolm X, from his humble beginnings as a small-time criminal, to his eventually incarceration where he finds solace with Elijah Muhammad (Freeman), the leader of the Nation of Islam. He finds his destiny by becoming one of the most powerful and efficacious leaders in recorded history.

Representing the stark contrast to the peaceful protests of Dr. King's nonviolent resistance movement, the drive and determination of Malcolm X and his followers stemmed from the utter frustrations within the black community in a time when violence and injustice were the norm. This film accurately portrays the slightly darker perspective of the Civil Rights Movement, not always fully represented in history texts, that accurately portray the individuals who were willing to take up arms, lay down their lives and overcome racial inequality by any means necessary.



#### **Grossmont honors black history** in month-long celebration.

The spirit of Black History Month is alive and well at Grossmont College for the month of February, as the campus presents a myriad of artistic, thought-provoking and even delicious activities for students to totally immerse themselves into the culture sharing experience.

The festivities began Feb. 9, with Dr. Antoinette **Linton**, a guest speaker from California State University, Fullerton and her lecture series "A New Perspective of Science Lecture Hall Engagement: How to Get Your Mind Right for Class." This event was followed by the Feb. 11 screening of "Something the Lord Made," the story of the black pioneer heart surgeon Vivien Thomas, and the Feb. 19 showing of "American Revolutionary: The Evolution of Grace Lee Boggs," a documentary on the Chinese-American civil rights activist.

Rounding up the mid-month activities was the African American Read-In on Feb. 17. a pro-literacy and African American authors appreciation rally that was originated by the Black Caucus of the National Council of Teachers of English. Hosted by Grossmont College English professor Sydney Brown and student guidance counselor "T" Ford, faculty and students gathered to read excerpts from famous African American authors in the tradition of the first sit-in held in 1989.

If you missed out on any these exciting events, there is still plenty more to come. A black male/ female relationships workshop will be held Feb. 26 in Griffin Gate, at 11:30 a.m. And the Grossmont College Choir will be presenting a choral reading of award-winning poet Margaret Walker's piece "For My People" on Feb. 26 at 7 p.m. in Building 26, Room 220.

Finally, the Grossmont Griffin Center Grill has been presenting "Jazz Kitchen, A Taste of Africa" menu **specials every Wednesday** of the month. The final one will be held Feb. 25 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. This specialty menu boasts authentic South African culinary delights such as Ethiopian peanut chicken soup, Sukuma Wiki greens and coconut pie.

# MR. GREY WILL SEE YOU NOW

The much-anticipated "50 Shades" hits the big screens, but how does it match up to the book?

he highly anticipated bookturned-movie "Fifty Shades of Grey," starring Dakota Johnson as Anastasia Steele and Jamie Dornan as the ever-so intriguing Christian Grey, came out on Valentine's Day weekend. Fans of this book have been waiting for this movie for quite some time, considering the book came out in 2011. Finally the wait is over, and Christian can seduce all of us through the big screen as well.

The book follows Anastasia Steele, an inexperienced literature student who gets entangled in the web of Christian Grey, who is a very charming, very beautiful, very erotic man. Anastasia cannot help but become quickly seduced by Christian when she interviews him for the school newspaper, and Christian also becomes quickly enthralled with this mysterious girl. But, like most men, Christian comes with baggage, a mysterious past and a very strange fetish for BDSM. Most logical women who aren't trapped by Christian's looks and success would run for the hills, and fast, but Anastasia doesn't. She agrees to become his sex slave, even though she knows deep down nothing good can come of it.

The book gets very sexual, and very fast. The very first sex scene came within the first 10 chapters.

Although captivating, it was too erotic for my-and plenty of others'—tastes. As many fans may know, the ever-so-famous tampon scene between Christian and Anastasia has been cut out of the movie. In an interview with Variety, Director Sam Taylor-Johnson said it "was never even discussed as being a part of the movie and was never going to be shot."

The movie was supposed to have both an NC-17 (no one under 18 allowed even with an adult) version and a R-rated (no one under 17 allowed without an adult) version was supposed to be released as well, but because of budget issues, that idea was quickly thrown out the window. The final rating from the MPAA is R-rated for "strong sexual including unusual behavior, dialogue and graphic nudity and language." The number-one thing people are most concerned about is just how sexual the movie actually is. It's estimated that the movie has 20 total minutes of sex scenes, which is about a fifth of the movie.

When it came down to it, the movie was pretty horrible. The acting was subpar, and there was close to no chemistry between Anastasia and Christian. The sex scenes were awkward to watch: the director did an amazing job at

portraying Christian as someone he totally is not in the book, emphasizing Anastasia's awkwardness. Throughout the entire movie, Christian said several things he never would have said in the book, and although he did say, "I'm fifty shades of f-ed up" in the book, the placement of this part in the movie had more people snickering than actually feeling sorry for him.

Viewers don't really get the chance to hear Christian's back story on why he is the way he is because the movie is primarily focused on Anastasia, so it makes it seem like Christian is just this horrible guy and Anastasia is just this dumb girl who is in complete lust. Grossmont student, Alyssa Hynic said: "I don't want to watch it because it got horrible reviews, and it sort of supports sexual abuse."

The sex scenes throughout the movie were short enough to the point where it didn't seem like viewers were watching a porno, so it definitely shouldn't be considered erotica. On the other hand, the few scenes in which Christian is "punishing" Anastasia were really hard to watch for some viewers. Critics of the book's main problem was that "Fifty Shades of Grey" was on the verge of being very abusive, and didn't show off a healthy sexual relationship between two people. Christian made Anastasia, and all the other women he had relations with. sign an agreement between the two stating in full detail what was expected of both parties-not limited to bondage, whippings, and making sure that Christian was referred to as either, "Mr. Grey" or "Sir." The movie did a good job of keeping the sex scenes, although plentiful, pretty short.

The audience sees Anastasia's full body naked, but not Christian's—just his butt and his abs, but never his frontal area. The book itself didn't show off a healthy relationship between two people, but seeing it first hand on the big screen definitely

added to that notion. Grossmont student Ranier Martinez said: "I wouldn't have even watched the movie if I didn't read the books, it (the book) was such a let down."

Overall, the book was okay, and the movie was not. Critics on IMDb.com gave it four out of 10 stars, which is totally justifiable. The only good thing about the movie was the soundtrack and Jamie Dornan. The only good thing about the book was the cute relationship between Anastasia and her best friend Kate. More people are probably watching the movie because they read the books and are curious. Either way, people are still watching it, even with the horrible reviews. theguardian. According to com, "Fifty Shades of Grey" has surpassed "Avatar" with \$248 million just on its opening weekend.

# A TIMELY PERFORMANCE

American Hustler Bradley Cooper wows in American Sniper.

irected by the quintessential American gun-slinging movie icon, Clint Eastwood ("Gran Torino," "Dirty Harry"), "American Sniper" offers a rare glimpse into a harrowing depiction of the post 9/11 war on terrorism coupled with one man's struggle to balance the responsibilities of family and patriotism in this Academy Awardnominated drama.

Based on the 2012 bestselling autobiography of the same name, "American Sniper" recounts the life and times of the man deemed most lethal sniper in US military history-

Christopher Kyle, aptly nicknamed "The Legend" by his fellow servicemen and "The Devil of Ramadi" by the terrorist insurgents he hunted. Oscar-nominee Bradley Cooper ("American Hustle," "Silver Linings Playbook") portrays the enigmatic Kyle as the film chronicles his military career, during which he is credited with more than 150 confirmed kills during four tours of duty in Iraq while simultaneously trying to maintain a family life with his long-suffering wife, Taya Kyle, portrayed by Golden Globenominee Sienna Miller ("The Girl," "G.I. Joe: The Rise of Cobra").

Cooper absolutely conquers this role with emotional, as well as physical, depth, as the actor completely

> transformed his body by gaining 40 pounds of muscle and embarking on the rigorous Navy SEAL training program prior to shooting the film. Physical appearance aside, Cooper also expertly conveys the psychological conflict of a serviceman's commitment to duty, coupled with the traumatizing aftereffects of PTSD. Cooper recently earned his third Oscar nomination

in a row, and rightly so, for his most recent performance in this film.

The film itself also garnered six Oscar nods in total, including Best Picture. The numerous sniper mission scenes are equally as thrilling as they are emotionally wrenching, providing the audience with first-hand accounts of the

judgment call of whether or not it is necessary to take a life, seen directly through the scope of Kyle's riffle. Director Eastwood is known for his no-holds-barred approach to grit and violence, but this film never takes the consequences of these decisions lightly,

as what tends to happen in more fantasy-based action and war films.

But this film is not without it's flaws. For instance, some of the disparages between the novel and film, while common in almost all film adaptations, are made even more prevalent due to the recent proven inaccuracies surrounding the validity of Kyle's accounts.

These tall tales range from Kyle claiming to have pummeled former Minnesota governor and popular professional wrestling star Jesse Ventura in a bar fight, to sniping looters during Hurricane Katrina. The many holes in Kyle's story, coupled with the cartoonishly off-putting mechanized prop babies that were awkwardly passed back and forth between Cooper and Miller in nursery scenes early in the film, have attributed a wealth of hilarious Internet memes as well as to much of the controversy currently surrounding this film.

Speaking of controversy, there is, of course, the outcry from members of the Middle-Eastern and Islamic communities on the negative overall representation of the people of the Iraqi region. Obviously, this is a story told through the eyes of an American Navy Seal, but there is not one singular redeeming quality or character from the "opposing team" to offer more balance in the film in order to present itself a little less like a pro-American propaganda snuff piece. The story is told from a completely one-sided perspective, as practically every Iraqi citizen Kyle encounters inevitably turns out to be a wolf in sheep's clothing.

"American Sniper" is an amazing film and, quite frankly, is needed now in a time where tweens regularly obliterate hordes of enemies with gunfire in video games and witness countless murders with reckless abandonment on television and movies. While rated R, this film spares no details on the harshness that war can bring, but it differs by taking into consideration the effects these decisions can have on a man's soul.

#### Women's Sand Volleyball

This is the inaugural season for sand volleyball for Grossmont and 17 other California community colleges who are geographically separated into four divisions.

According to the California Community College Athletic Association (CCCAA) website, it's the first sport to be added in a while: "After years of discussion and great perseverance from many individuals and organizations, women's sand volleyball has officially become the 24th CCCAA sanctioned sport. This is the first new sport sponsored by the CCCAA since women's badminton was added in 2000 and women's golf in 1995."

The Griffins begin their new season with a familiar face at head coach, Jamie Ivers, who also coaches women's volleyball at Grossmont. Ivers has guite the beach volleyball pedigree, having won the illustrious Manhattan Open, the mecca of volleyball tournaments in the United States. The Griffins open their season at home on March 13 at 10 a.m.

#### Men's Volleyball

Former Griffin and current head coach Travis Lee hasn't skipped a beat since becoming the man with the whistle in 2012. In his first season, he took the Griffins to their best ever finish, eventually losing in the California State Finals. He leads a poised Griffin unit that has vengeance on its mind after being bounced in three-straight sets in the first round of the 2014 State Championship. The Griffins still have eight home games left on the docket this season, so go fill up the gym! The next home game is against Long Beach on Feb. 20.

#### Women's Softball

After a thrilling 2014 season that saw the Griffins finish second in league, the season would culminate in the first round of the CCCAA Softball Southern Regionals at the hands of Cypress College. After a meager 14-20 first year, Head Coach Doug Hartung has turned the program around with two straight appearances in regionals and an impressive 45-34 record in that span. The Griffins first league game is set for Wednesday, Feb. 18 versus the defending Pacific Coast champs Palomar, who went 18-0 in league play last season.

#### Men's Baseball

Griffin's skipper Randy Abshier enters his 11th season at the helm. Griffins baseball has been a rejuvenated powerhouse the past two seasons (47-26), cranking out two consecutive seasons with more than 20 wins, and the program saw nine Griffins receive scholarships to


play college ball at four-year universities. Coach Abshier has a crop of young talent this season, with an unprecedented 22 freshmen on the roster. He had this to say about his standout freshman second baseman, Tanner Perry: "He's a guy that should have been somewhere out of high school, he's that good." Check out Perry's skills at the next home game versus East Los Angeles on Feb. 20 at 2 p.m.

#### Women's Badminton

After only playing four games last year; Grossmont added four more games to the schedule, along with four tournaments. More exposure and competition is sure to help this budding program. Head Coach Bill Gillespie, who also teaches exercise science at Grossmont, has the reigns again. The badminton team will open up its season Feb. 28 at the Grossmont Tournament.

#### Men's/Women's Swim and Dive

With the exception of Feb. 22, the men's and women's swim and dive will be competing at the same locations for each meet. Brian Harvey is the head coach of the men's team, while Larry Larsen oversees the women's team. 

"Bringing the right people to the table, putting in recommendationsand it's even more non-stop, but I have a passion for it," he said, adding that it's not too different from being vice president, just with more responsibility and a greater sense of the whole institution.

Other than working, Flood enjoys

Sophomore talent Martin Panayotov said he was proud of his team's performance: "We played well tonight. A true allaround game we displayed out there."


Cuyamaca freshman guard Chase Parsons said he thought his team could have played much better: "We are better than this. It did not show tonight, but we are."

or most who do not know what "adjunct" means, it's "a thing added to something else as a supplementary, rather than essential part," according Merriam-Webster. At many colleges, including, many teachers Grossmont, from City Mesa Colleges are referred to as "adjuncts." However, many take issue with the idea of adjunct faculty being "unessential." In reality,

many colleges rely heavily on adjunct faculty.

In education, "adjunct professor" considered instructor who is not vet full-time faculty, so he or she takes on any classes from their

choice of study, be it math, English, foreign languages, etc. at different schools--kind of like a substitute teacher, but for the entire semester. Because they do not have full-time positions, or the benefits that go with them, many adjunct professors work at multiple schools, adding up to the equivalent of several part-time jobs.

It can be a tough road, and this month, many adjuncts want to bring that issue to light across the

nation through National Adjunct Day. Held Feb. 25, the protest is hosted by labor groups.

The idea was proposed via social media by a San Jose University adjunct professor, who wanted to have a day where adjunct faculty walk out to grab the colleges' attentions and increase their support.

At Grossmont, tables will be set up to talk from Feb. 23-25 about the

> money needs to be put into the California state budget towards adjunct needs. They will have letters, stamps and envelopes for students

to send to the governor and other important figures in Sacramento.

The rallies will begin the day of the walkout in the main centers of the schools; the Grossmont rally will be held at 2 p.m. in front of the LRTC. Hosts have strongly encouraged other professors to bring their classes, saying it will be a great learning experience to let students know what is really going on in their campuses.

There is new and improved renovation in certain areas on campus, and Ken Emmons, chair and director of facilities, said more projects at Grossmont College are still to come over the semester.


Over the summer, the facilities department took down Building 38A, a modular-type building, and put together Parking Lot 88 to replace the area. Key repairs and potholes in the roads were a big fix.

Emmons, who has been the director of facilities since May 2013, brought along nearly a decade of experience working for Gafcon, a construction services company. These skills will come in handy next summer with the replacement of street lights around Grossmont, a remodel of the arts and communications buildings, all of the pool equipment being replaced, and the renovation of Parking Lots 2, 3, 4 and 4A, totaling up approximately 60 projects that Grossmont has to address.

Lighting upgrades are also on the agenda. Facilities has already installed LED lighting in a few areas around campus, and is looking to upgrade more of the buildings with lighting issues. Emmons and his team have some work to do with developments to make this campus sparkle.

#### EARN A BS IN NURSING ON CAMPUS

The nursing program at Grossmont has been taken to a new level. Starting next fall, all nursing students can continue their education through Point Loma Nazarene University without even leaving the Grossmont College campus.

The two colleges recently announced the partnership that will allow students to earn a bachelor's degree in nursing through a community college. Each fall and spring semester, a select 25 will be chosen to be in this special program.

Still receiving the same level of education, the tuition for this accelerated degree program is \$16,200—several thousand less than it would cost with room and board at the Point Loma college. A university advisor from Point Loma will be hired full-time to offer scholarships and enrollment assistance for the students.

"It is a wonderful opportunity for our graduates to benefit from Point Loma University's excellent nursing program," said former Grossmont president Dr. Sunita Cooke.

Dr. Bob Brower, the president of Point Loma Nazarene, agreed: "Together we can better meet workforce demand and support student success."

With this program, the community's need for nurses with bachelor's degrees will be filled quickly, building new possibilities for future students.

#### COACHELLA

Coachella is widely considered the king of all the festivals in the United States. Sasquatch! has quickly sprouted up as one of the more underrated festivals in the country. Over the past five years, Sasquatch has transitioned from an alternative indie-rock feel into a more versatile festival. Kid Cudi, Outkast, Kendrick Lamar and Childish Gambino have all performed in recent years, adding a hip-hop twist.

What makes this festival unique is its breathtaking imagery all around the venue. The Columbia River runs along the massive Gorge that extends out to the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest, creating a pretty epic background. In a 2013 interview with Rolling Stone, Pearl Jam's Mike McCready had this about the venue: "The stage overlooking the cliff of the Columbia River as the sun goes down—it's very spiritual."

ith school kicked into high gear once more, many students are finding themselves questioning what to do from here. Besides the obvious choice of transferring to a four-year university, some would rather graduate with an associate degree. But where would that take them?

Well, Grossmont's career center offers many options to help you with your career futures and academic choices. Like career-building workshops and seminars all held by our very own Nancy Davis, the career counselor at the college. For those who missed the first workshop, no worries—there are two more coming up in this spring semester to help you with soft skills and job search.

The Feb. 10 workshop was all about the occupational outlook of 2015, presented by Zhenya Lindstrom and Tina Ngo. Ngo took the students through priority sectors and in-demand jobs, which are based around people with an associate degree looking for a job. There are five different sectors:

- 1. Advanced manufacturing
- 2. Life sciences
- 3. Clean energy
- Information and Communication Technologies
- Health care

Each of these sections holds multiple jobs for those without a bachelor's degree and pay fairly well. "You start at one of these jobs and it is just a stepping stool to greater opportunities," Ngo said.

Some students made comments like "But jobs that are easy to get, you will get laid off because of overpopulation" and "How do we know that we are secure with these jobs?" Ngo explained how these jobs are there to help build back the job market and provide security.

Lindstrom then continued the workshop with focusing on certain students in the room, and how their majors could be transferred to these middleskill job opportunities. The fact that she went student to student personally pointing out how their jobs would have been in 2014 to now in 2015 and showing the growth in job opportunities was very comforting to many students.

"Not every major will have the exact job you want but thats when it is up to you to tweak what you are learning and make it work for today's career opportunities, a job will be there," Lindstrom said.

Lindstrom and Ngo took any questions from students and asked anyone too shy to ask aloud to come up and talk to them. She said she attended different schools, changed majors and took different career paths, but she said it taught her a lesson that this is the time to do all that—do it now and not later figure out what you want and go for it.

# Mherefore art thou?

### A charismatic duo brings Romeo and Juliet to life.

he latest upcoming Grossmont Theatre production explores one of the greatest love stories ever told, and it's sure to extol the virtues of a timeless romance with the help of its two charming young stars.

The names "Romeo" and "Juliet" will forever be synonymous to the wistful spirit of young love, thanks to William Shakespeare's enduring and tragic tale. Throughout its countless interpretations on stage and screen, an untold number of performers have taken on the role of the perennial "star-crossed lovers." Continuing the tradition, in Grossmont's inaugural production of the play, is Jillian Jones and Marco Rios.

Much like their titular characters. the two lead actors were brought dissimilar-yettogether from entwined backgrounds. Jones, a 20-year-old theater arts major from San Diego, and Rios, a 26-year-old San Diego State University grad student from Fresno, Calif., met for the first time during the auditions. Jones, admittedly, has dreamed of becoming an actress her entire life

"I started acting as soon as I could speak," she said. At 8, Jones was admitted into the Fine Arts Magnet Education (FAME!) program at Flying Hills Elementary School, and continued her acting aspirations throughout middle and high school. She currently works at the San Diego Musical Theater as a spotlight operator.

Rios began acting at a young age as well, appearing in touring productions of "Inside the Actors

Process: Characterization" and in the lead role of D'Artagnan in "The

Three Musketeers" throughout his acting experience. After high school, he was offered a scholarship to study classical theater, but chose a tennis scholarship instead. He is currently on track to becoming a psychologist, but still had a passion for acting, and began working with the Grossmont Theater Department last year.

Set against the backdrop of the prohibition period, director and theater arts instructor Jeanette Thomas' re-imagining of the classic tale whisks the familiar characters away from 16th century Verona, Italy, into the 1920s American gangster era of Chicago. The language of Shakespeare's original play will remain intact, minus a few scattered references to "fair Chicago," among others. So in actuality, the actors themselves will be tasked with challenge of guiding the audience through this mix of old and new interpretations.

"I've struggled with finding this Juliet," Jones said of the definitive character's contemporary counterpart. "She was not raised in royalty. She was raised in a wealthy American family. She's educated, and I do think she's confident, but she's 16 years old. How confident and how smart can a 16-year-old girl be? Especially in that time period."

Rios concurred with the struggle. "I'll find myself saying lines in a way that I wouldn't have naturally arrived at on my own, and I'm saying it in a way Leonardo DiCaprio or someone I saw onstage was saying it," he said of the process of making the popular character his own. "And I wonder, 'Am I discovering this, or am I just repeating what someone else has already said?"" Cont. on next page.

Unbridled passion devotion being the central themes of the play, one cannot help but wonder how a pair of actors, who were virtually strangers just a short while ago, began the process of transforming into two of the most iconic lovers of all time. Jones and Rios have made it a point to develop a relationship on and off the stage to create an honest rapport that will resonate onstage.

"Half of it is chemistry," Rios said. "Something happens onstage, and you don't understand why. And the other half is work. It's very much the same way you would enter a romantic relationship. We are wildly affectionate in this show. We have a scene that is post-marriage night, and all that entails. If you don't trust the other person or you feel threatened; just like in a real relationship, it's never gonna work."

Iones said Rios has made her feel comfortable in the role. "I think it's the way his voice bounces off of mine," she said. "This is definitely something that I've struggled with, because I've never been a love interest in a show before. But I love people, and I love getting to know and understanding people. So far it's been very easy with him."

"Romeo and Juliet" will run on March 12, 14, 19 and 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the Grossmont College Stagehouse Theatre. Special 2 p.m. matinée performances will also be held March 14 and 21. 
